Introduction

The following is an attempt to tell the story of M.T.A. hockey in particular and the Yeshiva League in general. It is unfortunately somewhat incomplete. Records do not survive from several years and we suspect that in many cases they were never properly kept. This situation has left no statistical record of many players (especially those who participated in the 81-82 and 82-83 seasons.) Obviously, some of those players were very successful, yet, no numbers exist to document their efforts. Hopefully, the publication of this work may lead to the uncovering of game and individual statistics for those years.

Despite the above drawbacks we were able to uncover complete individual and team records for fourteen out of the sixteen years that M.T.A. has participated. This is most extraordinary given the general poor state of record keeping in all Metropolitan Yeshiva Leagues. Indeed, the reader is advised that beginning with 1983 all M.T.A. regular season game records have survived. Therefore, all single season and career leaders as well as "all time" individual and team records are based on those twelve seasons (as well as the 1980-81 season which is also statistically intact.)

The editors wish to extend their thanks to Eliot Rothschild and Kenny Sheff who supplied us with game by game records of the 83-84 and 84-85 seasons respectively. We also wish to thank Rabbi Ellis Bloch who graciously opened M.T.A.'s student files to us in order to properly identify some long since forgotten players.

Forward

Perhaps, too, sports allows a degree of closeness between people hard to equal while in the grasp of activities devoid of similarly vivid communal orientation.

Alas, though, sports seems linked to youth or, at very least, to the young at heart. In the end, to quote Peter, Paul and Mary, most "magic dragons cease to give their fearless roar". As the tedium of life's more somber tasks envelopes us, "painted wings and silver things make way for other toys."

It is for those who can still feel the joy of M.T.A. hockey that the following pages have been assembled. It is for those who can still hear the "Here we go Lions, here we go!" echoing from the bench; for those who can still feel the chill down their spine induced by the Franklin K. Lane Gym; and for those to whom the Lion will never "sleep tonight" that this book has been completed.

And maybe, just maybe, those others whose hearing has been dulled over the years, they too will remember what a pre-Ramaz game lockerroom was like, and will each yearn, in the immortal words of Belloc, that when they grow very old, the "men who were boys when I was a boy shall come and sit with me."

All Time Season Summaries

What follows is a brief description of each year of the Yeshiva Hockey League and the M.T.A. team which participated in it. Unfortunately, those in charge of the league and of its M.T.A. entry failed to maintain any records for the 79-80, 81-82 and 82-83 seasons. Should anyone reading this work have any information about those seasons (or the 83-84 playoffs) they are asked to contact the editors in order to include that material in future editions of this work.

The reader is also advised that beginning in the late eighties the tale of the league becomes much more than a mere athletic record. The constant bizarre, callous and irresponsible attitude of the B.J.E. and its principals toward the league left literally hundreds of young men confused, bitter and with a lingering foul taste about their Yeshiva High School experience. A series of capricious decisions, as baseless as they were cruel, poisoned the atmosphere of the league for many years. This lengthy procession of Byzantine posturings and lack of responsiveness is only retold in part in the ensuing pages. The complete story could fill a good sized volume. It would involve details of a self imposed hysteria as painful to its victims as it appeared delightful to its perpetrators.

Thankfully, these antics largely petered out in the nineties. In fact, the league has functioned with little or no interference since 1992, the last time that the infamous "no fans" edict was toyed with.

Our volume, however, is about M.T.A. hockey and the League which, despite all, has survived. It is that story which deserves to be recorded and it is on it that the major emphasis of what follows is placed.

1979-1980 M.T.A. Roster

No exact roster for the 79-80 team has been uncovered to date. The reader is referred to the all time player statistical section for information concerning those players about whom it has been established did play that season.

The Yeshiva High School Hockey League was founded in the fall of 1979 due to the combined efforts of Gershon Bergwerk, a senior at Ramaz, and Michael Gelber, who served as its first Commissioner.¹ Each participating team was largely self governing with players paying their own entry fees, selecting their own coaches and co-ordinating scheduling. Most principals were not even aware of the league's existence and certainly none seemed to care if they were.

Rules for the initial season were rough-and-tumble with no restrictions on body checking and fighting punished by ejection only after the third fracas per contest. There were no equipment requirements and most players were helmetless. Commissioner Gelber's liberalism on these matters (so startling in view of his later positions) proved harmless and all involved escaped unscathed.

M.T.A. and Ramaz opened the season with a 4-4 tie at M.T.A. on February 10th, 1980.² They would go on to play another tie (2-2)

and Ramaz would triumph at home 7-3. In the end, however, both power-houses were upset on the same Sunday in early June by B.T.A. and J.E.C. respectively in the Semi-Finals.³ B.T.A. triumphed and the long awaited M.T.A.-Ramaz confrontation never took place.

2. Interestingly enough, the first game played in the newly formed league took place on December 16, 1979 as Ramaz hosted M.T.A. in an exhibition contest. (The Lions triumphed 7-4.) Thus, official Yeshiva League play has extended throughout three decades.
3. Ramaz in 1981-82 and O.T.I. in 1989-90 were the only other below .500 teams to besides J.E.C. to play in a title game. None of them emerged victorious.

Rabbi Mayer Schiller, coach of Ramaz, took over as Commissioner in the league's second year. Rule changes included an automatic game misconduct for fighting followed by a one game suspension and the elimination of sudden death in the regular season. A curiosity of this and the following year was the participation of Hastings, a group of public school youths from the town of the same name. (They were eminently well behaved and always punctual with their league dues.)

Once again M.T.A. and Ramaz dominated the regular season. However, the Lions had maintained the nucleus of their 1979-80 team while the Rams had lost 4 out of 6 starting forwards and 3 out of 4 starting defensemen from their regular season championship squad of the year before. Although splitting their season series (with Ramaz ironically winning at M.T.A. 4-1 while the latter triumphed at Ramaz 5-1) the Lions easily won their first championship, 5-1.

This year was the last for B.T.A. as the school closed that summer. Chofetz Chayim¹ would also never return, and Y.H.S.Q. became an all girl's school.

1. However, the following year a team combining O.T.I. and Chofetz Chayim students did return. Memories of the precise name of this entry are hazy. Some feel that they went under the O.T.I. sobriquet and the involvement of the C.C.ers was never known to the league. The employment of ringers was the subject of some controversy in the league's early years. It has since been established that in 1980-81, for example, both B.T.A. and Chofetz Chayim utilized players from other schools. Of course, the unique case of Hastings is utterly confusing in this regard since they were just a loosely knit group of friends who played together. What, if any, were their roster restrictions?

Randy Dulny, the then Junior Varsity Basketball Coach and Athletic Director of Ramaz became League Commissioner in 1981. He would continue in that capacity for the next three years. A rule change instituted under his leadership was the awarding of 2 1/2 minutes for a minor penalty as opposed to 1 1/2 under the Gelber and Schiller regimes. (It is worth noting this fact when considering both league and individual statistics for the 81-84 period. Teams had a minute longer on the power play than did those that played from 79-81 and from 85 till the present. [In

1984-85, 2 minutes was given for a minor.] All these changes, geared to impact upon the degree of roughness in the league, had absolutely no effect, as penalty totals remained generally constant throughout all 10 years of league play.)

The 81-82 season featured the smallest number of teams in league history. Both B.T.A. and Y.H.S.Q. were no longer functioning, so a mere four teams remained. Of that group, Hastings was clearly the superior contingent. Despite a shocking 3-3 tie with lowly Chofetz Chaim (the team was, in fact, an amalgamation of C.C. and O.T.I.) they swept through the regular season, earning a bye in the playoffs. M.T.A. struggled to its worst ever record. In fact, it was Chofetz Chayim's loss to Ramaz in the final game of the regular season which put them in the playoffs on the basis of a head-to-head tie breaker.

In the Semi-Finals Ramaz and M.T.A. played a classic series, with the Rams winning the hard fought duel 2 games to 1. However, Hastings easily dispatched Ramaz by lopsided scores in two straight games to win the League Championship. All of Hastings' players were seniors, so the team would never return. Captained in both their years by the talented Jared Weber, led by scoring phenomenon Jimmy Fayerweather and anchored in goal by Michael Paterson, they will forever be inscribed in the record books as the only largely non-Jewish team to capture a Yeshiva League championship.

This is the second of the "dark years" for which no statistical record survives. It was also the first of the H.A.F.T.R. championship years. Featuring Irwin Weltz, who some see as the league's greatest all time player, and hosts of Glucks, including the coach, Ivan Gluck, they tended to dominate league play, capturing the regular season title.

H.A.F.T.R. then dispatched Ramaz in two straight games for the championship. It was the first of three times those teams would clash for the title, and the last that would not be shrouded in controversy

(Note: The 82-83 team had two different jerseys which it wore at random during the season. One was purple with gold trim, last used by the 1980-81 squad which featured M.T.A. in gold letters across the chest. The other was a dark blue with white lettering and sported a Lion in front. Fascinatingly, some players had different numbers on each jersey. This accounts for the fact, noticeable in the all time roster, that assorted players from 82-83 are listed as having the same number. We were unable to accurately ascertain both numbers for all players. The following year, 83-84, would mark the first appearance of the since familiar white jerseys with red and blue trim. They would remain constant until the present.)

This was the last year (until 87-88) of non B.J.E. supervised hockey. Once again, Randy Dulny was in charge of operations. He would not have an easy time of it.

Athletically H.A.F.T.R., Ramaz and M.T.A. dominated, each with its nucleus of stars. H.A.F.T.R.'s was largely similar to the previous years' while the Rams featured Josh Rocklin, Michael Kubersky, Stu Schrader and Harry Poloner. (The latter two would play a leading role the following year.) The Lions were led by Michael Ratzker, Marc Henzel and Jerry Samet (all in their final year) and promising juniors Yechiel Gordon and Ari Schertz. As in the previous

2 years, M.T.A. was backstopped by Stuart "Duke" Morduchowitz, one of the league's all time best goaltenders.

Scandal rocked the circuit via the legendary, infamous Ramaz "White Castle Affair", resulting in school administered suspensions for many Rams and the firing of their Coach, Steven Hanks. His replacement, Steven Brown (the first league player (80-81, 81-82) to return as coach (84-85, 85-86)) was, despite all adversity, capable of steering Ramaz passed M.T.A. in the Semi-Finals.

The Championship Series scheduled to be a best 2 out of 3 affair opened at H.A.F.T.R. There, the Flames defeated the Rams, but at the game's conclusion assorted scuffles broke out involving players, coaches and fans. This led to a cancellation of the series, and H.A.F.T.R. was declared League Champions. It also resulted in the B.J.E. stepping in to supervise hockey. The league would never be the same.

The B.J.E.'s assumption of power would be of tremendous significance for the league. To begin with (and, perhaps, with no one realizing it) a name change was instituted. It was now to be the Metropolitan Yeshiva High School Hockey League, or M.Y.H.S.H.L. Randy Dulny was out as Commissioner. He was replaced by Jay Silman, a Washington Heights accountant and a stickler for detail. For the first time elaborate (if

preposterously confused) rules were drawn up at a Coaches' meeting and codified at length by Silman.

"Checking," a vague infraction left strangely undefined in the rules was now "not permitted" and an automatic one game suspension for fighting, last initiated by Rabbi Schiller as Commissioner in 80-81, was brought back. All in all the new administration worked reasonably well as a record eight teams participated.

M.T.A., under their new coach Elchanan Weinbach, dominated league play, setting a team record lowest goals against average of 1.28. The goaltending of David Schlussel was crucial to this accomplishment. Offense was largely generated by the above mentioned Schertz and Gordon, while juniors and sophomores such as Michael Mermelstein, Marc Fries, Michael Fischberger and Moshe Karash also contributed. Both H.A.F.T.R. and Ramaz fell to the Lions in the regular season by scores of 4-2 and 3-1 respectively.

However, the playoffs saw the return of an often injured Irwin Weltz to H.A.F.T.R., creating what many saw as the real Championship Game in the guise of a Semi-Final contest. In one of the most exciting contests the league has ever seen, H.A.F.T.R. "jumped all over" the Lions at M.T.A. establishing a 4-1 First Period lead via two goals apiece by Weltz and Barry Gluck. Yet, M.T.A. staged a miraculous comeback scoring five unanswered goals in the second period as Gordon and Schertz both scored twice along with Fischberger. H.A.F.T.R. countered with two more goals, and the game went into overtime. Michael Schreiber scored shortly thereafter (assisted by Mermelstein and Fischberger) capping one of the league's most dramatic battles.

Apparently M.T.A. had "emptied the bottle" against the Flames. Ramaz, a team composed largely of sophomores, had easily dispatched Flatbush in their Semi-Final contest 5-0. They then upset the heavily favored M.T.A. squad 5-2 aided by the superb goaltending of sophomore David Ingber and the offensive skill of his brother Adam to capture Ramaz' first ever championship. More would be heard from them and the Rams in the ensuing years.

The 85-86 season was one of the league's most successful both on and off the playing surface. Jay Silman continued his efficient job as Commissioner and the league expanded to its largest ever format consisting of nine teams.

Athletically it was one of the strongest fields ever seen with M.T.A., H.A.F.T.R. and Ramaz sporting what were virtually all star teams and O.T.I. and H.A.N.C. with strong rosters as well. During the regular season, Ramaz was beaten by H.A.F.T.R., while M.T.A. defeated the Flames and the Rams and Lions played to a 3-3 tie on opening night. Clearly parity had come to the league's elite.

In the playoffs, Ramaz journeyed to Lawrence and dispatched the Flames fairly easily, while M.T.A. struggled to defeat H.A.N.C. at home. The Championship for the second straight year was played at a jam-packed Franklin K. Lane gym. After nearly two periods of scoreless hockey, Ramaz scored and added a second goal to start the third period. However, Marc Fries of the Lions scored with less than 3 minutes remaining in the game and then with a mere 12 seconds left Geoffrey Miller centered the puck to Mermelstein who tied the contest. Sadly for the Lions, their miracle comeback was halted by Adam Ingber's goal at 7:14 of the First Overtime Period.

Ramaz' victory, their second in a row, concluded a fine season. Principals and administrators lavished praise on the league. For the second year in a row the championship coaches organized a year end All-Star Game with the M.T.A. led West squad achieving a modicum of revenge by defeating the Ramaz dominated East contingent 8-4 in a game played at Flatbush. Little did anyone dream that a peculiar, malignant psychosis was soon to seize control of the B.J.E. and plunge the league and its participants into years of lunatic turmoil in the decade's second half.

The 86-87 season proceeded as flawlessly as did its predecessor. Once again the Ingber led Rams dominated play with H.A.F.T.R. a close second while a surprising H.A.N.C. Cavalier team featuring perennial All Stars Shawn Rosenthal and Erik Lassar finished a strong third. M.T.A. suffered through one of its worst seasons ever finishing in fourth and losing at home for the first time since March 15, 1981, when they were beaten on February 8, 1987 by H.A.N.C. 4-3.

The Playoff situation was somewhat confused due to O.T.I.'s end of season 2-1 victory over Sephardic which placed those two teams as well as J.E.C. in a three way tie for sixth place, the last Playoff spot. It was decided by Commissioner Silman that a series of mini-games of 15 minute duration would be held with one team (J.E.C. it turned out) receiving a bye as well as home field due to a drawing. At the end of a thrilling day at Elizabeth, J.E.C. defeated Sephardic to grab the last Playoff spot. At the conclusion of the O.T.I.-Sephardic game a small fracas occurred. This was to become the first part of the apocryphal puzzle that would grow by feeding on itself inside the minds of the B.J.E.ers.

H.A.N.C. and M.T.A. easily won their preliminary games. H.A.F.T.R. defeated H.A.N.C. in a tough fought and somewhat disputed game in Lawrence while Ramaz dispatched M.T.A. at home 3-1. At the Ramaz game a Ram player reacted to the hundreds of M.T.A. fans packed in behind the goal at the Madison Avenue end of the gym by swinging his hand in back-handed fashion at the crowd behind the netting - bloodying the nose of a girl standing there. This event, transformed via a series of Bunyonesque, lurid re-tellings, became the sole basis for the neurotic obsession with "fans at games" that seemed to cling to the minds of B.J.E.ers in later years.

The Championship was a defensive contest which ended

after regulation time with the score tied 1-1. Towards the end of the First Period the Ramaz Coach Steve Saffer and Joel Lasher, the O.T.I. Coach who served as the H.A.F.T.R. trainer since his son played for that team, engaged in a shoving and shouting match at their benches. This event, no worse than dozens of similiar incidents at Yeshiva sporting events over the years, became as best as can be determined, the basis for the "fans always fighting" mantra uttered with an incessant drone at assorted bizarre B.J.E. convocations in subsequent years.

The best was yet to come. After the First Overtime Period ended tied the assembled principals decided that only five more minutes could be played because, alternatively, "the boys were tired", "it was a school night" or "there was a risk of injury." Accordingly, five minutes later the game was ended without a winner having emerged. This seemed to some to be the height of ludicrousness. Little did anyone know that far stranger events were still to come.

The paroxysms into which the apocryphal events of 86-87 sent the B.J.E. reached their apex in the fall of 1987. After a series of meetings to which no one who had any first hand knowledge of the league was ever summoned, it was decided that the two problems with hockey were

that the gyms were not padded and the referees were not "professionals" (!) These two new problems amazingly eclipsed the "fans are violent" and "fans cause violence" which were seemingly generated in 86-87, but amazingly hibernated until 88-89, 89-90 and 90-91 when, with no new incidents to support them, they became the league's number one problem! In any event it was decided that the league was to be completely banned until the gym and referee problems could be solved. Why in eight previous years no one had so much as dreamed of these concerns was left unstated!

For five months "exhibition games" were played in what were supposedly "dangerous" gyms. At that point the coaches of H.A.F.T.R., Ramaz and M.T.A. met to see if they could salvage the league. They decided that, since all principals were permitting games in "dangerous" gyms before "violent" fans and with non-"professional" referees provided these games were labeled "exhibition", it only seemed logical that a whole season could be played, calling all its games "exhibition"! Never believing that the principals would ever go along with anything so absurd they put the matter before their superiors. To everyone's shock and amusement the response of all concerned was "yes". A regular ten game season could be played if it was labeled "exhibition". This semantic change miraculously allowed games to be played in all gyms, with the old referees and in front of the "dreaded" fans! Accordingly, the 87-88 season which for five months was completely forbidden became the longest schedule of games in league history!

M.T.A. and H.A.F.T.R. dominated and concluded the regular season with identical 8-2 records. The deadlock was broken by a mini-game which H.A.F.T.R. won 2-1. In the Semi-Finals the Lions and the Flames easily dispatched Ramaz and O.T.I. respectively by scores of 4-0 and 8-4.

The Championship Game was a wild affair in which the lead changed hands 5 times. In the end M.T.A. triumphed on two late goals by "superstar" Ira Feintuch and the Lion Captain Brian Jedwab. The date, May 31, 1988, was seven years to the day since M.T.A. had last won the league title. As the Lions and Flames concluded the contest no one would have predicted that the B.J.E. machinations would reach a frenzied climax the following year.

1988-89 : No league

In 1988-89 M.T.A., under returning former head coach, now Rabbi Elchanan Weinbach, selected a hockey team. Their efforts would prove to be just so much water poured into the sand as the B.J.E. declared that this year, finally, hockey would be banned. No clear reason was given for the edict. Rumors seemed to indicate that it had something to do with "violent fans" or "fan induced violence" both of which had acquired a life of their own in the increasingly hysterical minds of the B.J.E.¹ In the end, however, M.T.A. and Ramaz played four games against each other, one an "exhibition game" and the other three an "exhibition series". All four featured fans and non professional referees. Did this imply that M.T.A. and Ramaz administrators dissented from the reasoning of the B.J.E. ban? Logically it would seem so, but as all were to learn yet again the following year there was no logic to the Kafkaesque universe of the B.J.E.

1. Cynics suggested that this year's particular B.J.E. frenzy was due to one of the principals being loudly criticized by a parent at the previous year's championship. However, any attempt to really unravel the B.J.E.ers' logic would seem to present a thankless task for even the most determined researcher.

In 1989-90 the simmering Blob of "fan violence" and "fan induced violence" grew to unmanageable proportions in the principal's minds. For five months they debated whether to allow the league to be resurrected. Finally, it was decided that the league could continue if no fans would be allowed. This was described as an experiment to see if fans

could in the future be allowed! The logic of the above escaped all concerned except its advocates. The person who was appointed to head this experiment as commissioner of the league was Roy Engstreich, the Ramaz Director of Student Activities.

In the regular season M.T.A. and Flatbush dominated with the Lions winning their only meeting at M.T.A. 7-4. However, a funny thing happened on the way to the seemingly inevitable Championship. O.T.I. upset the Lions 2-1 in the Semi-Final contest. This earned them the right to be thoroughly trounced by Flatbush 3-0 in the Championship Game.

Fans were allowed at this contest as they were at the M.T.A. Semi-Final Game, but not, confusingly, at the Flatbush-Ramaz contest. This seemed to be a successful conclusion to the "experiment" but the following year the mad chemists of the B.J.E. had a few more surprises planned.

Roy Engstreich continued to serve as Commissioner, presiding over the longest season in league history and a larger than usual assortment of bizarreness emanating from the strange environs of the B.J.E. As far as M.T.A. was concerned, all the lunacy could not detract from what

was clearly their finest hour as a team.

In October, Engstreich summoned the coaches and captains to a meeting in order to review league rules. He reasoned that since the 89-90 season had been played without the "violence prone" (alternatively "violence inducing") fans as an "experiment", therefore the "successful" conclusion of last years' events should logically yield a "*heter*" for the coming year. All present agreed this was logical. As far as the strange and virtually incoherent rulings on padding, movable walls, tables etc. no one present (least of all Engstreich) seemed particularly serious about them. (Of course, as in all similar cases, there was one coach who dissented from the above consensus.)

All went well early on in the season until after about a third of the schedule the B.J.E. woke up to the fact that a) hockey was being played and b) fans were present. An emergency meeting was hastily convened at the citadel, B.J.E. headquarters. Edicts were issued. All previous rules were to be enforced immediately. In response to a query as to what was the purpose of the 89-90 decrees if after what was supposed to be a trial period they would go right back into effect, the answer was, "changes cannot be made in mid season". Of course the changes has already been made de facto if not de jure. With the exception of Flatbush, the rest of the league continued to completely ignore what was by now clearly nothing more than a silly joke. A final lunatic (there can be no other word) footnote to all the above is that when Engstreich proposed Franklin K. Lane as a championship site both the Flatbush Principal as well as their coach agreed. This was allowed despite the fact that the Lane gym clearly met no league criteria whatsoever. The explanation given was that since the league had played there before, it was ipso facto "kosher". Of course the league had played there before any gym decrees had been made, so the statement

made no sense at all.

Athletically, 90-91 was the year of the Lion. M.T.A., led by senior superstars Jeff Mann and Cliff Aboff and offensive defenseman Uri Weinstein, dominated league play; in the process they rewrote nearly the entire M.T.A. record book. This was not merely a team of superstars, though. It was a squad so deep in talent that its third line offense of Steven Genack and Shragi Kassai could easily have been starters elsewhere. Indeed, its starting lineup featured young phenomenon Ron Friedman, who was destined to become the only sophomore to ever score a Championship goal for the Lions. Anchored in goal by Chaim Leffel the Lions defeated all opponents, dispatching their most potent challenger, Flatbush, by scores of 7-6 and 8-3 away and home respectively.

By the time playoffs rolled around, the M.T.A. machine was in high gear as they trounced Ramaz 7-1 in the Semis. A dark cloud hanging over the squad was dispelled on May 30, 1991 when two players sitting out academic suspensions were re-instated a scant five and a half hours before Championship Game time.

The finale came at Franklin K. Lane, scene of heartbreaking M.T.A. losses in 1985 and 1986. In a sweltering gym with temperatures over the 100 degree mark, a tough, gritty defensive struggle was played out. The M.T.A. heroes were Friedman and Genack who notched the contest's only tallies; Chaim Leffel who shut out the Falcons; and captain Jeff Mann, voted the game's M.V.P. It was the Lions' third Championship, more than any team had ever achieved. In the post Championship euphoria a strong case could be made that the 1990-91 Lions were the greatest team the school had ever produced.

The 1991-92 Season began with two matters fairly clear to all participants. 1) The B.J.E. would undoubtedly, after the third "violence" free season of "experimentation" with "no fans in order to see if there could be fans" (!!), be finally cured of their strange phobia and permit the dreaded spectators. 2) The H.A.F.T.R. Flames returning to the league after a self inflicted three year exile (performed to the usual administrative hysterical rantings about "violence") had the most talented roster of those competing. This latter assumption was largely based upon the departure of Ron Friedman from M.T.A. and his summer enrollment in H.A.F.T.R. (prompted it was said by a desire to broaden his pursuit of knowledge in the Five Towns environs long established as a congenial atmosphere for liberal arts endeavors.) In the end both these pre season speculations would prove wildly off the mark.

Michael Gelber who last served as league commissioner in the maiden season of 1979-80 relinquished his head coaching job at Flatbush to resume his former administrative post. He did maintain his position, however, as Flatbush athletic director, a fact which led some credence to those who saw his dual loyalties as easily leading to a conflict of interest. This suspicion was somewhat bolstered in the eyes of cynics when the league's new three divisional format was unveiled at a pre-season coach's meeting to reveal the Falcons surrounded in "Division II" by

perennial powerhouses Hillel and J.E.C.

Before the season started it became clear that the B.J.E. for no reason any inhabitant of this earthly vale of tears could discern would once again ban fans and that once again all involved would timidly acquiesce in the now annual flight over the cuckoo's nest.

Early season play saw H.A.F.T.R. dispensing its opponents with relative ease as had predicted. M.T.A., who the experts had seen as stripped of all talent via graduation (with the exception of Fruchter and Weinstein) was, nonetheless, administering its traditional thrashing of all comers aided largely by the superstar play of a junior, Aaron Warum.

The mid season confrontation between the two undefeated squads proved anticlimactic, though, as the Lions playing at H.A.F.T.R. trounced the Flames 8 to 2. This victory was followed by M.T.A.'s crushing of Flatbush (8-3) and H.A.N.C. (8-2) as all involved began to suspect that the Lions were once again the class of the league.

H.A.F.T.R. on the other hand saw their situation go from bad to worse as they were tied by lowly Hillel and finally defeated by Ramaz in the season's last game.

The playoffs produced a near upset as Hillel was narrowly defeated by Flatbush in the preliminary round. This was a Flatbush team surrounded by controversy as they managed within the span of five days following the end of the regular season to fire, rehire, rehire as an assistant and finally witness the resignation of their coach and his replacement by a high school teacher with no experience whatsoever.

M.T.A. easily dissected Flatbush in the Semi-Finals with Fruchter, Weinstein and Warum accounting for 6 of their 9 goals in a 9-3 massacre. Ramaz having eked out a victory over H.A.N.C. in the preliminary round was due to visit H.A.F.T.R. in the other Semi-Final. However,

the Flames no longer had a home gym and so they agreed (perhaps too hastily) to play the Rams between Madison and Park. This touch of hubris proved their undoing as Ramaz upset them 4-2. For the first time in five years the gold clad brigade was back in the championship.

A massive controversy ensued concerning the site of the Championship Game recounting the details of which would take us far beyond the confines of this limited summary. Suffice it to say that the game originally scheduled for April 12th was finally played on May 31st at the Yeshiva of Flatbush. Ramaz proved that they indeed deserved to be in the title match as they stuck close to M.T.A. throughout the afternoon, eventually losing by a 7-5 count. Uri Weinstein received the game M.V.P. award and the M.T.A. victory was significantly aided by Junior Noam "Spinner" Spinowitz' two timely goals, the superb defensive effort of Eric Berkowitz and the usual relentless and creative play of Fruchter and Warum.

Although the 91-92 team did not compare with its predecessor in offensive depth, its small group of superstars proved an unstoppable force and the remainder of the squad did what had to be done to give M.T.A. its second straight undefeated Championship season.

Common wisdom had it that 92-93 would finally be the year that graduation would end the Lions' winning streak and championship reign. No team had ever won three consecutive championships and the departure of Weinstein and Fruchter, together with the return of Glick and Friedman to H.A.F.T.R. seemed to lend considerable credibility to the Flames' positing themselves as titlists waiting to be crowned. Although Warum was returning to M.T.A., he was the sole member of the legendary "fab four" to do so and despite his prodigious talents it was widely assumed that the elusive "threepeat" was beyond his and the Lion's collective abilities.

However, when M.T.A. exploded from the starting gate crushing Hillel (12-1), Frisch (15-1) and Ramaz (6-0) it began to dawn on league analysts that they had vastly underestimated the skills and determination of M.T.A.'s "supporting cast". Naftali Bennett was emerging (to the shock of all concerned) as an outstanding offensive defenseman piling up points on par with those of the recently departed Weinstein. The forwards Daniel Lifschutz, Ross Rothenberg, Noam Spinowitz and David

Hornblasse were well on their way to a combined 42 goals by season's end with the ever rapidly improving play of the last mentioned proving especially potent. On the defensive side of things Marc Berger and Dov Adler were exhibiting abilities to rank with M.T.A.'s all time best. Finally Ari Gellman was finishing his near decade long association with M.T.A. hockey with goal keeping that would prove both mind boggling as well as record shattering.

In Lawrence, however, great expectations were once again proving unfathomably difficult to put into practice. An upstart Flatbush Falcons contingent, not seen by many as exceptionally talented, were imbued with an extraordinary spirit by their rookie coach Leonid Yurovsky. The maroon brigade managed a hard fought 2-0 victory over the Flames early in the season and the league's balance of power seemed once again to be shifting away from the Five Towns. Shortly thereafter the Lions also dispatched the Long Islanders by a 6-1 count. Friedman and Glick, despite two years of hoopla were still demonstrably incapable of getting things done when it counted.

As the season progressed M.T.A.'s superiority was proven repeatedly, including a 23-0 mauling of H.A.N.C. Yet, Flatbush also continued its unbeaten ways setting up the teams' February 4, 1993 confrontation as a battle for league supremacy. Although the Falcons put up a fierce struggle and their star goaltender Leib Feldman performed admirably, the Lions lethal offense proved fatal. Five different M.T.A.ers scored as the defending champions notched the third of four consecutive shutouts (5-0).

In late February Flatbush once again defeated H.A.F.T.R. Victory came in dramatic fashion via an overtime goal by the feisty, offensive talent Mark Goldman. This game held in Brooklyn was preceded by the now ritualistic predictions of easy victory by the Flames and followed

after defeat by the (now) equally predictable statements of disinterested apathy.

M.T.A. closed out their season by dispatching Frisch and Ramaz with relative ease (12-0 and 14-1). Aaron Warum concluded his season with a record setting 22 goals, an amazing career total of 81 points, repeated feats of extraordinary wizardry and ingenious creativity with the puck and a fiery commitment to victory which led many to see him as perhaps the greatest M.T.A. player of all time.

With Ari Gellman setting an all time M.T.A. record with his 0.69 goals against average and Bennett's 3.37 average points per game placing him sixth overall in Lions' history, prospects for the coveted "threepeat" seemed bright.

The quarter finals saw a minor upset as Ramaz, despite two regular season defeats at the hands of Hillel, finally overcame the Jerseyites in a thrilling, come from behind sudden death victory 3-2. Rams' heroics were provided by their superstar defenseman Ira Teicher whose tragic fate it was to play for the gold and blue during a decidedly lackluster period in their traditionally glorious hockey history.

H.A.F.T.R. would have to journey to Brooklyn to encounter Flatbush for the third time in the Semi Finals and all concerned felt that finally the red and whites' superior talent would take them to the Championship. Once again confident voices emanated from the former Hillel gym. "For once we really care" or the now legendary, "We'll have no problem with Flatbush in Flatbush" and finally, "We'll beat M.T.A."

Indeed, when the game began it did seem that H.A.F.T.R.'s conceit would not provoke Asgard's wrath as the Flames scored twice in the opening minutes of the contest. Departing to the lockerroom at the

period's conclusion amidst WWF type threats bellowed by the rival coaches, the gold helmeted band looked beaten. Yet, hard work and commitment slowly began to reap their just rewards as Flatbush tallied twice in Period Two. No one scored in the Third Period and the game entered Sudden Death.

Alas, for the Five Towns' lads the inability of money to buy love must now be extended to its evident failure to purchase victory. Ari Lieber scored close to the end of the first overtime. The Flames quickly departed en masse disregarding the traditional handshaking to return home and proclaim how they didn't really care. Truth is though, they wanted very much to win... and failed.

M.T.A. encountered little difficulty from Ramaz in the other Semi-Final contest, trouncing the Rams 9-1 in Washington Heights. Spinowitz picked up where he left off in last years' playoffs with a hat trick, Warum added his now expected (at least) four points and Bennett added two tallies of his own. The stage was set for the second Lions-Falcons title contest in two years.

For the first time in recent memory the league was heading towards its championship with no hitch in sight. Clearly for the Mad Hatters who govern the league it was time to arrive on the scene heavily armed with lunacy. The annual escape of the inmates from the asylum had begun. First, season long guarantees of a neutral site gym for the championship "on Long Island" were acknowledged to be spurious. Then Ramaz and Frisch, the league's two absurdly plastic stick gyms were offered. Finally, it was announced that the game must be played in Flatbush (despite this being the home of the team with the inferior record) with a limit of sixty spectators per team.

At this point an assortment of heroes entered the tale,

prominent among them were M.T.A.'s Naftali Bennett who led some of his more principled comrades in a refusal to participate in yet another farcical finish to the season. Rabbi Spiegelman (first heard from two years ago when he helped out in that years Championship finale fiasco) made his annual appearance as hockey league supporter accompanied this time by Rabbi Finkelstein as well. Finally, when the smoke cleared almost two months since the Semis had been concluded a suitable site was found, Forest Hills High School in Queens.

And so on Sunday afternoon May 16th, 1993, the Lions headed to the imposing structure on 110th street to seek their thirty sixth consecutive victory as well as their "three-peat". The Falcons were not the Flames and the matter would not be resolved easily.

Indeed, Flatbush fought hard throughout in a highly physical contest and never gave up. The Lions, though, had just too much talent as well as determination. When the game ended shortly after 8:00 P.M. Gellman had yet another shutout, Rothenberg two goals, Lifschutz a hat trick and the game M.V.P. and the Lions by an 8-0 count, an unprecedented third title.

With four talented forwards, five superb defensemen, a virtually impregnable goalie and the Olympian repertoire of their captain, the 92-93 Lions came as close to perfection as any M.T.A. team in history ever had.

A tragic and malicious footnote was added to 92-93's saga a mere two weeks after the Championship Game. The Flatbush hierarchy, for the second year in a row, chose to fire their coach. This decision clearly not motivated by athletic or morale considerations (for Yurovsky had clearly achieved extraordinary success both on the court and in the hearts of his

troops) was seen as yet another chapter in the maniacal attempt of some to dampen the enthusiasms of others whenever possible.

The 92-93 Lions would add an appropriate postscript to their extraordinary season. Unlike their immediate predecessors, they began at season's conclusion the arduous task of producing the legendary M.T.A. Films' highlight video. Dashing about from Hillcrest, New Rochelle, Fair Lawn and Teaneck, and converging repeatedly on Hackensack and Monsey, the Lions enabled Bob Suede to produce yet another lifelong momento of the inexorably ebbing fires of youth.

The 1993-94 season was one of the most peculiar in Lion's history. It saw the team sink to lows unthinkable in recent years, but it also witnessed moments of traditional domination as well as exquisite triumph.

A vastly improved H.A.N.C. squad fell to the Lions 7-1 on opening day. This was followed by a hard fought 5-2 defeat of Ramaz, featuring three goals from the line of newcomers Barry Zelcer and Daniel Cohen. A 16-0 drubbing of O.T.I. seemed to indicate that the Lions were getting on track, especially since Captain Eric Mauskopf and Alternate Captain Elon Zibitt each contributed hattricks. Two weeks later, Mauskopf again tallied three times as did Azriel Rauzman leading M.T.A. to its fifth consecutive double digit win over Frisch (13-1).

It was on January 2, 1994 that some chinks were noted in the defending threepeter's armor. A 6-2 win over Hillel in Deal was achieved only after shockingly, laborious effort.

Once again, though, on the second half of a home and home series the Lions' roller coaster swung upwards, as they battered Hillel 14-2. Dov Rauchwerger led the way with four goals and two assists.

Meanwhile, H.A.F.T.R. was sporting its own unbeaten streak. The Flames were the only team capable of holding their head high, for Flatbush was stunningly upset by Frisch and Ramaz struggled along at a .500 pace. At the mid-season break it seemed like a two team league. February 6, 1994 was targeted as D-Day when the Flames would visit Washington Heights.

The Lions had not lost in 42 consecutive regular season

games and had not been defeated at home since the spring of 1987. All previous victories were to no avail though, as H.A.F.T.R. defended admirably well and emerged with a 3-2 victory and a chance at being the league's only team to finish a season undefeated other than M.T.A.

Smarting from the H.A.F.T.R. defeat, the Lions hammered Flatbush, leading 5-1 after two periods. However, once again, inconsistency overcame success. The Falcons fought back, and M.T.A.'s 10-5 final victory was less than impressive. So too, was their 9-3 triumph over Frisch the following week. It was the first time in the decade that the Lions had defeated the Northern Jerseyites by less than double digits.

The season ended on a sour note with Ramaz holding the Lions to a 1-1 tie after 41 minutes of hockey. M.T.A.'s eventual triumph via Moshe Hornblass' skillful shoot-out goal was minimal consolation.

In the playoffs Flatbush and Ramaz' victories, although expected, were achieved with far too much effort to bode well for either team's future. Nonetheless, in the Semi-Final it required two shorthanded goals by Zelcer and Andrew Bronfeld for M.T.A. to defeat Flatbush 2-1. This surprising result was dwarfed by H.A.F.T.R.'s mind-numbing loss to Ramaz 3-1, their third consecutive Semi-Final exit.

For the first time in four years, the Lions entered a championship game without being clear cut favorites. True to their erratic form, though, they proceeded to play their most impressive game of the season. M.T.A. totally controlled the contest from start to finish and their 8-0 victory did not adequately reflect the one-sidedness of the affair. Rauchwerger contributed a hat trick, Spira set a playoff record with five assists (some of great creativity) and Zibitt added two goals including the contest's opening salvo. Daniel Leffel played commendably well in

goal, tying Gellman's playoff record goals against average of 0.50.

Yet, this year's M.T.A. contingent was also distinguished by the heroic playoff efforts of its blue collar brigade. The extraordinary forechecking toil of the line of Ezra Berenholz and the above mentioned Bronfeld combined with the scrappy tenacity of Eli Brazil and Jonathan Tiger kept the Rams virtually imprisoned in their own zone throughout the night. The Lions were anchored in the Championship as they had been all season long by the stalwart defensive play of William Draiarsh whose goal at the ten minute mark (the Lion's eighth) tied the M.T.A. and league record for most goals scored in a title match. Although strikingly inconsistent, the 1993-94 Lions will be remembered as the team that played their best when the stakes were highest.

Darwinian determinists have long posited the inevitable triumph of matter over spirit in all situations. Clearly these theorists are unaware of the 1994-95 M.T.A. Lions. Not since Gene Tunney came off the mat to take the title from Jack Dempsey has a contender been down for the count and more only to experience an Elijahian resurrection.

M.T.A. began the season lacking a clearly established star. Their defense was missing the playmaking quarterback of the Weinstein, Bennett, Rauchwerger era. Up front their hopes rode on the shoulders of Azriel Rauzman and Moshe Hornblass whose mediocre contribution to the 93-94 campaign did not bode well for the future. In goal Josh Kirschenbaum who, despite flashes of brilliance during pre-season as a Sophomore, had floundered in his few game situation opportunities. Yes, there was the welcome addition of the roundball refugees, Andy Frank, Yehudah Samter, and Ephraim Friedman, but the true extent of their hockey abilities was anybody's guess.

Elsewhere, Flatbush were seen as the favorites, for the Falcons had several stars of three years experience. This talented nucleus remembered all too well their 8-0 Championship drubbing suffered at the Lions' hands in May of 93. H.A.F.T.R. was its usual competitive self, Ramaz could never be counted out, and just north of Route 4 growls were being heard from the vastly improved Frisch Cougars. In fact, it was the Frischers (led by former M.T.A. keeper Chaim Leffel as rookie Assistant Coach) who grabbed the early season headlines. Ruthless obliterations of T.A.B. (13-0) and T.A.B.C. (13-2) established their credentials. Yet, it was

their triumph over Ramaz (5-1) shockingly achieved at 78th street combined with a shoot-out victory over Flatbush (4-3) which led Frischers everywhere to dream not only of a winning season (the school's first ever!), but of challenging for the brass ring itself.

The Lions began their "drive for five" with a workmanlike triumph over Hillel (7-2) as Rauzman, Danny Gotel, and Frank each tallied twice. Game 2 saw the O.T.I. Flames employ a novel strategy (reminiscent of Italian tactics in 82's World Cup), refusing to send any player on the attack and waiting patiently for a Lions' error. The circled wagons proved porous as the Lions, paced by Rauzman's four goals, produced a 10-0 victory.

It was on Sunday December 4th that the Lions began to unravel. With two minutes remaining in the Second Period, sporting a 4-1 lead over Ramaz, the team's defense and goaltending fell apart. The Rams scored four unanswered goals to go up 5-4. It was only Rauzman's tally with less than two minutes to play which salvaged a regulation time tie. The overtime was scoreless and in a shoot-out (not devoid of controversy) Rauzman and Captain Jonathan Morgenstern each scored to give M.T.A. a bittersweet victory (6-5).

A 15-2 mauling of T.A.B.C. (featuring a hat trick by Scott Rothenberg) while satisfying, did not allay the team's self doubts. Their next opponent was Frisch, in the Cougar's den.

Although the Lions would have the better of the play against Frisch, the latter's superb netminder Ben Epstein was Horatio at the bridge. His acrobatics yielded another regulation time tie (2-2). This time bizarre shoot-out officiating resulted in Rauzman's goal being disallowed. The referee, having confused one and all by tooting his whistle more frequently

than did Captain Lou Albano in his prime, tried to make amends by calling for a "do-over" and disqualifying a Frisch shooter. It was to no avail. Frisch won, 3-2, and sat triumphantly in first place. The Lions were sinking fast.

Four days later they seemed to disappear beneath the surface. Flatbush scored five (!) goals in the Third Period at M.T.A. to give the defending champions their second straight defeat (5-2). In Lawrence, Flatbush and Paramus the word was out : The Lion was badly bloodied and fit for the kill.

Firing blanks in hockey, the 4-2 Lions opted to cancel practice and schedule a team tackle football game. This legendary event, later known as the "Mud Bowl" or the "Christmas Classic" seemed to mark a turning point for the squad. It was then, in a move reminiscent of Broadway Joe's 1969 pre-Super Bowl boast, that Morgenstern announced the Lions would not lose again until the Championship was won. Having "talked the talk" Captain "Johnie" would now have to "walk the walk".

Conjuring up images of the *Bonhomme Richard's* embattled Captain, the Lions proceeded to demonstrate that they too had "not yet begun to fight". Led by Rauzman's hat trick they trounced H.A.N.C. 7-0. On February 5th Frisch visited M.T.A. A loss here would have sealed the team's coffin. Like the ancient Phoenix, though, the Lions rose from the ashes. Led by Hornblass' two goals, they shocked Frisch and the highly touted Epstein 5-1.

A week later the Lions journeyed to H.A.F.T.R. to face the league's only remaining undefeated team. In a game that did not please defensive purists, M.T.A. emerged victorious 6-5, with Rauzman's three goals and Samter's game winner the crucial factors. Kirschenbaum shook off a mid-Third Period injury to keep H.A.F.T.R. away at crunch time, achieving a solid, if less than eye pleasing, triumph.

The Lions 7-1 defeat of Ramaz in the season's finale (highlighted by Hornblass' hat-trick) was a confidence booster. Yet, for the first time ever the Cup was in reach of four legitimate contenders.

The Quarter Finals (visited by M.T.A. for the first time since 1987) saw Flatbush beat Ramaz (6-2) and the Lions batter Hillel (15-2). In the Semi-Finals it would be the 8-2 Falcons and Lions visiting the 9-1 Flames and Cougars.

In Lawrence, Flatbush triumphed in a surprisingly one sided contest 5-2. It was the Flames fourth consecutive (!) Semi-Final exit. Verily, the Haftarians were Sisyphus incarnate of Yeshiva hockey.

M.T.A. struggled mightily in Paramus before realizing their much desired revenge over the Forest Avenuers (8-3). Defensively, the defending Champions were led by Friedman who held the Cougars at bay throughout the evening. Samter and Gotel scored shorthanded and Rauzman found the mark twice as the Lions chased the fabled Epstein from his net with over four minutes left to play. "C.J."s prediction was one game short of fulfillment.

The Championship took place after the now traditional six week hiatus following the Semies. Held at Frisch on the humid Thursday night of May 18th, the Lions led throughout the contest. Kirschenbaum finally silenced his critics with stellar netminding. Samter and Rauzman each scored twice and it was Gotel's rocket which kicked off the scoring midway through the First Period.

Indeed, the Lions triumph was the result of many contributors. Frank's 3 assists and Hornblass' goal were continuations of their prodigious regular season output. Jacob Bernstein, Eli Mermelstein, Stephen Mauskopf and Rothenberg gave the big guns a much needed rest as they

consistently kept the pressure on a rapidly tiring Flatbush defense. Last but not least, Shlomo Shuster's timely assist supplied the cake's icing.

The Lions had achieved the unbelievable, a fifth consecutive title. Yet it was this, of all five Championships which, accomplished against so much adversity, may well rank as the most glorious M.T.A. title of all time.

The 1995-96 season was the most competitive in the M.Y.H.S.H.L.'s history with four teams finishing within four points of each other. Indeed, it took the final week of the season to determine the precise order in which the contenders (Ramaz, H.A.N.C., M.T.A. and H.A.F.T.R.) would finish. This level playing field presented quite a challenge for all concerned and particularly for M.T.A. who began the year as five time defending champions.

The gap separating the better teams was almost microscopic. Ramaz beat H.A.F.T.R. (3-2), Frisch beat H.A.F.T.R. (4-3), H.A.N.C. tied Ramaz (2-2), H.A.N.C. beat H.A.F.T.R. (4-3), Ramaz beat Frisch (4-3). Not only did these results reveal that no team was dominant, but that none could beat the other by more than one goal.

M.T.A. would also discover that it was very much a part of the parity which had come upon the league. The Lions would never achieve - although they would flirt with at times - their traditional dominance of the circuit.

An opening day demolishing of O.T.I. on December 3rd (featuring a Rothenberg hat trick) by a 14-2 margin was encouraging, but it was marred by two O.T.I. goals surrendered fairly early in the contest. This less-than-perfect start was followed by a startling two goal Frisch outburst within 45 seconds of the start of the next game. The Lions regained their composure and, paced by Mermelstein's two goals, defeated Frisch 5-3.

This was followed by the standard dismembering of J.E.C. which had been lacking of late due to the latter's three year absence from

the league. Led by Mermelstein's hat trick, M.T.A. triumphed 10-1. Flatbush then proved fairly easy fare (5-2) and the Lions seemed on track.

But on the frigid night of December 26th the team's fortunes began to plummet. Despite Rothenberg's two goals they only managed to beat T.A.B.C. by a 4-2 count. This was followed by stunning back-to-back losses at home inflicted by H.A.N.C. (3-2 in overtime) and H.A.F.T.R. (1-0). The Lions had never been shut out in their history. Many thought that this was finally the end of the line for the M.T.A. dynasty.

As in 94-95 it took a football game in the park to turn things around. Following the "Snow Bowl" the Lions trounced Hillel (9-1) with both Rothenberg and Schwartz contributing hat tricks. M.T.A. then took its new found confidence to 78th Street where Mermelstein and Bernstein each scored once in the game's final three minutes to tie the contest with Ramaz. They then each scored again in the shoot-out for a stunning come from behind victory. The season's finale saw an amazing four goal performance by Mauskopf and a convincing 6-2 M.T.A. victory over Rambam thereby eliminating the latter from the post-season.

In the playoffs the Lions met Flatbush in the Quarter-Finals where a recently returned from injury Eli Polak opened the scoring. The Falcons were defeated 4-1, but their roster, stocked with juniors, promised to be a factor in the future.

The Lions for the second year in a row found themselves guests in the Semi-Finals. This time they were in H.A.N.C. against a Cavalier squad that had lost only once during the season. Mermelstein opened the scoring with two early goals and H.A.N.C. never threatened with the Lions winning 5-1.

Ramaz was upset by H.A.F.T.R., so after four consecutive

Semi-Final ousters the Flames were finally going to the big game.

The championship was once again played at Frisch. A huge crowd, overwhelmingly supportive of the red clad Lawrence-ites descended upon Forest Avenue. In the First Period H.A.F.T.R. dominated, but thanks to a short-handed goal by Jonathan Bronfeld they went to the intermission tied 1-1.

From that point on it was all M.T.A. Mermelstein, Bernstein, Rothenberg (2), Alan Teller and Marc Gibber each scored. For the second year in a row an M.T.A. team which had not dominated the regular season managed to get going when the going got tough. At the game's conclusion, with the Lions supporters chanting "6 in '96", this far-from-perfect team could rest content with the realization that, despite their regular season faults, in the playoffs they had outscored the opposition 16-3 and done their part to keep the championship streak alive.

Individual Leaders

The all time leaders' statistics here documented speak for themselves. What needs to be noted is that our decision to base single season leaders on average as opposed to total points was due to the widely divergent lengths of the seasons in question. - 2) The number of players on the playing floor during play will be FOUR skaters and a goaltender.
